

All Grades

- Citizenship- reinforcing responsibilities as a library patron in both school and public libraries.
- Ongoing individualized instruction: read for pleasure and personal growth, researching techniques, evaluating resources, and help with editing, typing, formatting.
- Use of technology and web-based programs. Sharing and using information ethically.

Kindergarten Classes

- Kinderbook Field trip -Steele Memorial Library, students receive public library cards.
 Program and transportation provided by <u>Friends of the Library</u>.
- Library orientation

1st Grade Classes

3rd Grade Classes

- Library orientation
- Fiction and non-fiction books, Dewey Decimal system
- Reference books: encyclopedias, thesaurus, & dictionary skills
- Regions of the world

- Map skills
- Increasing independence in the library.
- Units included: biomes & reference books, using the catalog, OPAC- utilizing the library catalog to look up books & locate on selves, finding information, creating citations,
 Hello Around the World unit (Common Core unit), stories from different continents

4th Grade Classes

- Library orientation
- Dewey Decimal system
- Demonstrating independence in the library
- Map skills
- Units included: using the catalog, Dewey Decimal System, Colonial trades research and poster project, (Common Core unit).

5th Grade Classes

- Fiction & Non-fiction books, independence in the library, using the catalog to locate books, book genres.
- Units included: Book Blog- Students wrote and edited book reviews, posted reviews to class blog, posted comments to others' reviews. (Common Core unit), Underground Railroad web quest.

Programs

- Kinderbook- Worked with Steele Memorial Library, provided Kindergarteners with library cards & field trip to the library for story, library card, tour, and a new book.
- Book Fair- \$4,918.11 in sales earned the libraries \$2,276.91 in books between the two libraries.

Improvements

- Revised a number of units for the K-5 library.
- More project-based units that tie library skills in with the classroom curriculum.
- Provided additional instruction for 3-5th grades by meeting with classes during computer sessions: citations, research, using databases.
- Weeded over 900 outdated books, primarily in the nonfiction section.

- Purchased additional books to support Common Core modules and STEM program.
- Utilized a COSER again this year to purchase hundreds of books to replace outdated materials that better align with elementary school curriculum.
- Concentrated purchases in the fiction section, especially for the older readers.

Future Plans

- Meet with 4th grade to develop more cross-curricular projects.
- Plan lessons to carry over into computer lab; work with teachers and Connie Gleason.
- Collaborate with 5th grade teachers at beginning of the year and plan research projects.
- Include an Internet safety presentation to 5th grade.
- Continued attention to information ethics in upper elementary lessons.
